One way to connect to the experiences of the past is to read about them through the words of those who lived them. This short list is not all-encompassing, but gives some great general context for the emigration experience, and specifically, the LDS experience and how it was the same or different from the general experiences of western emigrants in the same era.

A day-by-day compilation of original notes, with nicely-drawn maps and event illustrations. Combined with general western emigration experiences, this helps illustrate the commonality of the first LDS pioneer company's daily progress and adventures, but also includes great details from the first company.

Recollections of Handcart Pioneer of 1860

Mary Ann Hafen

University of Nebraska Press, ISBN 0-8032-7340-1 Though Mary Ann was only 6 when her family made the crossing in 1860, her recollections of the trip and her life in Utah are clear and quite detailed. The author likely drew on the memories of others when writing her memoir, but those details do stand up to historical documentation and are a great window into one girl's experiences.

Villages on Wheels

Well-researched and richly detailed, this book looks at the social organization of the early LDS pioneers, and their travel experiences. Drawing on primary source voices of men, women, and children, it's a good companion volume for understanding the emigration experience as a full and rounded travelling community—a full exodus of society, intact.

Uniquely youthful documented voices fill this volume of stories from young pioneers recounting their own experiences. Very little editorial chat disrupts the flow of stories, and each has documentary detail about their origination points, travel dates, and later history.

Though this book spans into later travel years than the first, it includes great stories from young people who started their western emigration on a ship to the US.
